From the Tumuaki

E ngaa mana, e ngaa reo, e ngaa hau e wha, tiihei mauriora!

I would like to extend my thanks to students, staff and whaanau for the work and support that has gone on to ensure that term two has been a successful one at Pukekohe High School.

We have built on the positive start to the school year by continuing to focus on the key areas of student attendance and engagement, quality teaching and learning and the celebration and strengthening of our school culture. All of these facets of school life are critical in ensuring that our students are enjoying their experience and that they are able to achieve to their potential across a range of areas.



In the last newsletter I commented on our school attendance goals and progress towards these. I would like to commend all students who have maintained a level of attendance of 90% or higher so far this year. This is the level of regular attendance as deemed by the Ministry of Education. It was pleasing to note that in term 1 of this year we had fewer students in the chronically absent category - less than 70% total attendance - than we did at the same time last year. We still have a way to go to reach the national attendance targets. Every day in the classroom counts.

Just as the school has an expectation for student attendance, we also have an expectation for the provision of quality teaching and learning programmes and effective teacher practice in the classroom. This year our teaching staff have been participating in a programme of professional development facilitated by Evaluation Associates based on the Niho Taniwha model of teaching practice. The focus of these sessions has been on supporting staff with their understanding and use of proven and deliberate teaching strategies that lead to engaging lessons and positive student outcomes. We look forward to continuing this focus throughout the remainder of the year.

During term two, staff and members of the middle and senior leadership teams have been focussing on promoting our school values and the meaning and messaging behind these:

- Manaakitanga the ability through our actions to uplift and support the mana of all those • around us.
- Aarahitanga the ability to lead and guide the way through our actions.
- Kotahitanga the ability to unite as a school community through our participation in school activities and a shared positive attitude towards learning.
- Puumautanga the ability to show resilience in the face of challenges.

A huge acknowledgement to the many students who have been recognised for displaying our values through the student recognition system.

A highlight towards the end of the term was the blessing and opening of our new learning block and Learning Support Space. The learning block, which will be named in due course, includes ten flexible learning spaces, staff and small-group work rooms and creative areas with kitchen facilities. These spaces will cater for classes across a range of learning areas. We look forward to having students and staff utilising the block from the first day of term three.



The following are two reminders regarding policies that we have here at school.

Phones:

At school, in line with national guidelines, there is an expectation that phones are away throughout the school day. Confiscation will occur if students are in use of a phone in class.

Social Media/Digital Harm:

Any student caught videoing any act that is against school rules and/or sharing these videos on Social Media will face sanctions in line with the people in the video.

We want to ensure that the high expectations that we have at Pukekohe High School creates a safe and positive learning and social environment. We will continue to work with students to ensure that they understand and are complying with the messages above. We appreciate families supporting this.

<u>Uniform</u>

When representing our school, it is important to maintain a smart appearance in our community. This entails wearing the appropriate uniform at all times. Blazers are acceptable for all year levels. The sports uniform is not considered part of the school uniform and should only be worn during sports fixtures when representing the school. In the case of colder weather, black leggings or stockings may be worn with long skirts for extra warmth. Additionally, students are permitted to wear black beanies. Our smart uniform requires all-black shoes and socks. We appreciate your support in our pursuit of excellence at Pukekohe High School.

Finally, I would like to express my sincere thanks to James Thomas, our Principal for the last two terms. In his short time here, James has forged positive relationships with students and staff. He leaves us having devoted much time and energy to ensuring sound leadership of the school. I thank James for his guidance and support during this time of transition and wish him all the best for his future endeavours.

Have a relaxing and enjoyable holiday break. We look forward to seeing everybody back for the start of term 3.

YES Challenge 2 - Pitch: On 23 May 2024, nine YES Companies presented their business and product ideas at the Auckland Chamber of Commerce, Manukau. Each company delivered its pitch within the 5-minute timeline. The judges were impressed by the innovative ideas and comprehensive business plans, covering marketing, production, sales, and financial forecasts. Koru Calm attained the highest mark of 91%, demonstrating exceptional creativity and business acumen. A heartfelt thanks to all parents and caregivers for their support, making this a positive experience for our young entrepreneurs.

Level One History: Earlier this term our Level One History students visited the Auckland War Memorial Museum to learn about New Zealand's involvement in World War Two. A great time was had by all exploring the exhibits, learning about war medals, and examining various items associated with the war (including some dress-up). Thanks to the Museum educators for an interesting and engaging time.

Level Two History: Another group of Historians - this time our Level Two students - visited the Auckland public library to learn more about the books and primary sources held there. Thanks to the research librarians there, they were introduced to the Heritage Collections and were exposed to new avenues of research for their studies. Students found the trip to be really interesting and more useful than they had anticipated. All enjoyed their visit.

Model United Nations Assembly: Again, this year we sent two teams to participate in Rotary's Model United Nations Assembly in May. Held this year at Rosmini College, our teams represented Somalia and Kuwait and spoke on topics as diverse as space and women's rights. All six students really enjoyed the experience, citing the opportunity to network, develop their speaking skills, and learn more about the world as the most rewarding aspects of the entire weekend. Somalia took away a special mention prize for best presentation - due in large part to their pirate costume choice.



Ethics Olympiad: For the second consecutive year, Pukekohe High School competed in the national Ethics Olympiad. Our team faced down schools from around the motu in a highly structured format, discussing ethical issues such as Sportswashing, the rights of animals, and Sharenting. Although we didn't place we did receive an honourable mention. The Ethics Olympiad is an amazing opportunity for students to test their critical thinking, problem-solving and ethical reasoning and we will be entering again in 2025.

Tourism: Students interested in pursuing tertiary studies in Tourism visited the International Travel College. There, guides led them through an in-flight simulation, allowing them to experience what it's like to work for an airline. The college even had a life-sized airplane cabin where students could sit down and use the intercom speaker to give flight instructions. Additionally, we visited two workplaces in the tourism industry: AJ Hackett Auckland Bridge Bungy & Climb, and the All Blacks Experience. These visits provided students with a deeper understanding of what it's like to work in the industry. Thank you to the Careers Department for partially funding this trip.




Girls with Hi-Vis Event
