Malo e lelei, kia ora koutou and greetings to the Pukekohe High School community.

Welcome everybody to the mid-point of term three. As we approach a busy part of the school year it is an important time to reflect on what

has been achieved so far and where we are headed throughout the remainder of the year and into 2025.

## Learning and achievement:

Firstly, I would like to acknowledge and congratulate our senior students who continue to track towards their NCEA qualifications. As this newsletter goes to press, our achievement data tells us that over 53% of all internally standards have been completed. 82% of these standards have been completed at achieved level or higher. There is much work still to come, including NCEA literacy and numeracy co-requisites for Years 10 and 11 students in week eight of this term, grading exams for Years 12 and 13 in week 9 and external examinations for Years 11-13 taking place in October and November.

Junior students continue to work on their learning programmes and assessment in all of their classes. Progress can be monitored through the Kamar parent portal alongside the fortnightly engagement reports that go out.

It has been pleasing to see many students taking up the offer of extra support through homework clubs and other opportunities that are being presented by departments. I would like to acknowledge the staff involved in running these extra sessions. Further information about these extra opportunities is included later in this newsletter.

## **Extra-curricular:**

In my first month as Principal, I have greatly enjoyed the opportunity to get out and observe the range of extra-curricular activities that Pukekohe High School students are participating in. From the recently completed KBB music festival, to the Autaia haka theatre event, to YES market days to the range of sporting teams competing in Counties and Auckland competitions, our students continue to represent the school with pride, enthusiasm and skill. More about many of these activities to follow.

Whether it be in a coaching, management or organisational capacity, I would like to express my thanks to members of staff and the community for enabling these activities to take place. These experiences offer not only an avenue for students to pursue their passions but also opportunities to develop positive traits and habits that feed into other aspects of life.

The school has just begun the process of constructing our new strategic plan. This will act as our guiding document for the next three years (2025-2027) and help us to shape the type of school that we want for our young people and community as we move forward. All the best for the remainder of the term.



## Attendance

## Kaunihera Hauora |Well-being



Students learn how to use the coffee grinder and doser, to tamp the grinds, and extract the shot. They also have to foam the milk and create the perfect coffee to deliver to the well deserving staff.

After enjoying their coffee, staff complete a

feedback form which is returned to Catering teachers. This builds toward the student's portfolio for the practical component of the assessment.

## Franklin STEM Expo



## Upcoming NCEA Exams/Assessments

**Year 11** students are currently completing in class external assessments in most subject areas. Each subject area will have informed students of these, including the lessons they will sit them in and what is required. Most of these external assessments require students to use their own laptops to complete.

Year 11 students who have not yet gained their literacy (reading and writing) and/or numeracy will be completing these as digital exams in **week 8**. Students will need to use their own laptops to complete these.

Year 10 students who have been identified as curriculum level 5 will also undertake the literacy (reading and writing) and numeracy exams during week 8 and will also require their laptops to complete these.

Year 12 and 13 students will undertake grading exams during week 9. These exams offer students the opportunity to become familiar with the end of year exam and they form the basis for emergency grades if needed by NZQA.
