Schools, by design, are an extension of the community in which they serve. A place where young people, 1900 in our case, and the staff who work alongside them, come together for the purpose of further developing the skills and attributes in readiness for the world after compulsory education.

Over the course of the last four weeks it has been fantastic to sit alongside the community to recognise the achievements of so many Pukekohe High School students. The annual Poo Whakanuia Maaori Awards evening, Senior Prize Giving and Sports Awards ceremonies are



occasions where success in all of its forms - academic, cultural, sporting, service, leadership is celebrated. These events have highlighted for me once again the breadth of talent in our student body and the commitment to success and achievement. We look forward to continuing the celebrations with our junior awards ceremonies at the end of the year.

This week marks the beginning of the NCEA external examinations. In the world of NCEA, the importance of external examinations is sometimes overlooked. In order to have access to the highest levels of achievement - merit and excellence endorsement - students must reach these levels of attainment in their externals. I wish all of our senior students the best in their preparations for, and completion of, their exams and in their quest for academic excellence.

Term four is the time of the year where much work is being put in by our staff to ready courses and programmes for the following year. We have some exciting developments in terms of the offerings for our students as we look to provide an engaging curriculum across all year levels to meet the needs of the young people of the Pukekohe region. A number of new junior courses including Money Matters, Electronics, STEM, Toi - look to be great additions. In the senior school, the advent of the Year 12 Pathways Programme with a focus on Building, Automotive, Agriculture and Electrical and Engineering aims to provide contextualised learning with work experience and off-site educational opportunities for students with interests in these areas.

In my senior prizegiving address, alongside celebrating the successes from throughout the year, I spoke of the need for us to look to the areas that need improving. I have mentioned in earlier newsletters the attendance challenges that a number of our students, and students around the country, are facing. We want students at school every day. We know that this is a hugely important factor in their overall achievement. We will continue to push the attendance message, support our students and families and follow up with those who are not attending school regularly.

The remainder of the school year for our juniors is filled with opportunities for continued learning and experiences outside the classroom. We are nearing the commencement of Year 10 camps at Tapapakanga Regional Park, starting in week 6. This is a fantastic experience for all of our students to experience the great outdoors. Our Year 9s have an action-packed end-of-year with Year 9 project days, IBM Crazy Ideas workshop and Wharefest. I look forward to seeing our juniors finish the year in a positive way by getting involved in all of the activities on offer.

Regular = 90+% attendance (5 days or less absence per term)


Irregular = 80-90% attendance (5-9 days absence per term

Moderate attendance = 70-80% attendance (10-14 days absence per term)

Chronic attendance = less than 70% attendance (15 or more days absence per term)

School Policy Changes for 2025

In our review of 2024 and planning for 2025 the following changes have been made. These will be implemented at the beginning of next year. We will begin communicating these changes to students through assemblies and Teams pages.

- 1. **Cell phone policy:** We have been grateful for the huge reduction in the use of phones in class following the change in school rules around cell phone use last year. Engagement and behaviour has improved as a result. In order to meet the government's policy guidelines from the start of 2025 Pukekohe High School will extend the ban on phones to include the whole school campus. That is, phones will need to be away and out of sight during break times as well as during class times. As with our policy during class times, should a phone be sighted teachers will have the right to confiscate these and take them to the reception. Phone can then be collected at the end of the school day by students.
- 2. Year 13 students on site: To help with our drive to improve attendance, Year 13 students will be required to remain on the school campus throughout the school day (unless they are signing out for a permitted reason). A designated Year 13 common room and a separate study space will be provided and furnished over the summer break ready to accommodate Year 13 students who are on their study period.

We thank students and whanau in advance for supporting these changes which we think will continue to promote a positive school environment.
